The book concludes with a thought-provoking discussion of various strategies which help vulnerable people speak to power on more equal terms. *Speaking to Power* will be particularly helpful to advocates working with people who have mental health or learning difficulties, for doctors, nurses and social workers involved in advocacy work, and students preparing to enter those professions. It will also be of interest to students of social policy and other readers concerned about Britain's broader social and political development.
